


Dear PCAU Members and Friends,

We are grateful that the government has taken a positive step by considering few positions for palliative care providers in the public service from the National Specialized Hospital up to Health Centre III. The PCAU Branches will host physical meetings in their regions after May 26th. We have advertised research grant opportunities and look forward to working with those that qualify. 
This month April 2023, we are accomplishing our fundraiser for the New PCAU Motor vehicle. We have





program is intended to increase the number of palliative care professionals, especially for

underserved districts.

Of the 146 Districts and Cities in the country, there are at least 40 districts without a single health facility offering palliative care. This year the ADPCN scholarships are awarded to applicants from a total of 20 districts. Of these 5 have no single palliative care unit within their districts and we hope to support them to start.


We are implementing the Pain-Free Hospital Initiative (PFHI) in 3 Regional Referral Hospitals: Soroti, Mubende, and Masaka. We are delighted that these series of trainings have yielded so much


introduced palliative care in Uganda in 1993. Uganda boasts of several achievements since then.



Access to medicines and medical supplies for patients facing cancer in the countryside. We continue to advocate for access to essential medicines and other medical supplies for patients in


